

**EFFECT OF META COGNITIVE QUESTIONING TECHNIQUES ON  
SECONDARY SCHOOL STUDENTS' CRITICAL THINKING SKILLS IN  
PHYSICS IN JOS NORTH L.G.A OF PLATEAU STATE, NIGERIA.**

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***Abstract***

*This study explores the impact of metacognitive questioning techniques on the critical thinking skills of secondary school physics students. Using a quasi-experimental design, 45 students were divided into an experimental group (n=24) and a control group (n=21). The experimental group received instruction incorporating metacognitive questioning techniques, while the control group received traditional instruction. Pre- and post-tests were administered to measure critical thinking skills. The ANCOVA results revealed a significant effect of the intervention on the post-test scores of the experimental group ( $F(1, 42) = 38.41, p < .001$ ), indicating that metacognitive questioning techniques significantly enhanced students' critical thinking skills. Based on these findings, the study recommends integrating metacognitive questioning techniques into the physics curriculum, providing continuous professional development for teachers, encouraging regular student reflection, utilizing technology to support metacognitive practices, conducting further research on the long-term effects, and applying these techniques across different subjects to foster critical thinking.*

**Introduction**

In recent years, the integration of metacognitive strategies in education has garnered significant attention due to their potential to enhance students' learning outcomes. Metacognition, defined as the awareness and regulation of one's

cognitive processes, plays a crucial role in effective learning and problem-solving (Avargil, Lavi, & Dori, 2020). In the context of physics education, metacognitive questioning techniques have been identified as a powerful tool to foster critical thinking skills among students. Critical thinking, which involves the ability to analyze, evaluate, and synthesize information, is essential for mastering complex scientific concepts and solving intricate problems (Bogdanović et al., 2015). Traditional teaching methods often fall short in developing these skills, as they tend to focus on rote memorization rather than deep understanding and application of knowledge. Metacognitive questioning techniques, on the other hand, encourage students to reflect on their thought processes, ask probing questions, and engage in self-regulated learning (Mota et al., 2019).

Recent studies have demonstrated the effectiveness of metacognitive strategies in improving students' academic performance and cognitive abilities. For instance, Ulu and Yerdelen-Damar (2024) found that metacognitive activities significantly predicted physics identity and self-efficacy among high school students, highlighting the importance of these strategies in science education. Similarly, research by Bogdanović et al. (2015) revealed a moderate correlation between metacognitive awareness and achievement in physics, underscoring the benefits of developing metacognitive skills for better learning outcomes.

Moreover, a meta-analysis by Camarao and Monterola (2021) showed that metacognitive strategy instruction had a significant overall effect on the conceptual change of students in physics compared to conventional teaching approaches. This finding suggests that metacognitive strategies not only enhance students' understanding of physics concepts but also promote long-term retention and application of knowledge. Additionally, Akpan, Sa'adatu, and Dauda (2022), found that metacognitive learning strategies significantly improved problem-solving behaviour among secondary school physics students in Nigeria, further supporting the global relevance of these strategies.

In addition to improving problem-solving skills, metacognitive strategies have been shown to enhance critical thinking abilities. Rivas et al. (2022) conducted a study on the development of critical thinking in higher education through metacognitive strategies. They found that students who participated in a metacognitive intervention program exhibited significant improvements in critical thinking skills, demonstrating the potential of metacognitive strategies to foster higher-order cognitive processes. This study also highlighted the importance of active learning methodologies, such as Problem-Based Learning (PBL), in promoting metacognitive and critical thinking skills.

Furthermore, Camarao and Monterola (2021) conducted a meta-analysis on the effects of metacognitive strategy instruction on student conceptual change in physics. Their analysis revealed that metacognitive strategy instruction had a significant overall effect on students' conceptual understanding compared to conventional teaching approaches. This finding suggests that metacognitive strategies not only enhance students' understanding of physics concepts but also promote long-term retention and application of knowledge. Additionally, Jegede and Awodun (2022) investigated the impact of metacognitive strategies on students' learning of physics in secondary schools in Nigeria, finding significant improvements in both conceptual understanding and academic performance.

The study of Reinhard et al. (2022) assessed the impact of metacognitive post-reflection exercises on problem-solving skillfulness in physics. Their findings revealed that students who engaged in metacognitive reflections demonstrated improved retention of newly learned problem-solving techniques, underscoring the importance of metacognitive strategies in fostering long-term learning and application of knowledge. This study also emphasized the role of conceptual understanding in enhancing problem-solving skills, suggesting that metacognitive strategies should be integrated with content knowledge to maximize their effectiveness. Given the promising evidence supporting the use of metacognitive strategies, this paper aims to explore their impact on retention and academic achievement in secondary school physics students. By examining recent research and empirical studies, this paper seeks to provide a comprehensive understanding of how metacognitive strategies can be effectively integrated into physics education to enhance students' learning experiences and outcomes. Despite the critical importance of physics in the secondary school curriculum, many students in Jos South L.G.A of Plateau, Nigeria, continue to struggle with retention and academic achievement in this subject.

Traditional teaching methods often fail to engage students effectively, leading to poor understanding and low performance. There is a pressing need to explore innovative instructional strategies that can enhance students' learning experiences and outcomes. Metacognitive strategies, which involve students' awareness and regulation of their learning processes, have shown promise in improving academic performance in various subjects. However, there is limited research on their specific impact on secondary school physics students in this region.

This study aims to fill this gap by investigating the effects of metacognitive strategies on retention and academic achievement among secondary school physics students in Jos South L.G.A. Specifically, the study aims to determine the effect of metacognitive strategies on the retention of physics concepts among secondary

school students and to find out the outcome of metacognitive strategies on the academic achievement of secondary school physics students.

### **Research Questions**

The following research questions were raised to guide the study: -

1. What are the differences in critical thinking skills between students who receive instruction incorporating metacognitive questioning techniques and those who receive traditional instruction?
2. What is the effectiveness of metacognitive questioning techniques in enhancing critical thinking skills among secondary school physics students?
3. What is the relationship between the frequency of metacognitive questioning and the improvement in critical thinking skills?

### **Hypotheses**

The following null hypotheses were formulated for testing to guide the study.

1. There is no significant difference in critical thinking skills between students who receive instruction incorporating metacognitive questioning techniques and those who receive traditional instruction.
2. There is no significant difference between the effectiveness of metacognitive questioning techniques and traditional instruction in enhancing critical thinking skills among secondary school physics students.
3. There is no significant relationship between the frequency of metacognitive questioning and the improvement in critical thinking skills.

### **Methodology**

This study employed a quasi-experimental design with a pre-test and post-test control group. This design allows for the comparison of the effects of metacognitive questioning techniques on students' critical thinking skills in physics. The participants were secondary school students from two different schools. One school served as the experimental group, and the other as the control group. The sample consisted of 45 students (24 in the experimental and 21 in the control group respectively), selected through random sampling to ensure diversity and representativeness. The instruments used were: The Critical Thinking Skills Test (CTST): A standardized test to measure students' critical thinking skills before and after the intervention; the Metacognitive Awareness Inventory (MAI): To assess students' metacognitive awareness; the Physics Achievement Test (PAT): To evaluate students' understanding of physics concepts. The procedure used was: Pre-Test: The CTST and MAI were administered to both the experimental and control groups to establish baseline data Example, Activity: Students completed the CTST, which includes questions like "Explain the reasoning behind your solution to this physics problem." Intervention: **Experimental Group**: Implement metacognitive questioning techniques during physics lessons. This involves training teachers to

use specific questioning strategies that prompt students to reflect on their thinking processes: **Planning Questions:** “What is your goal for this problem? Example, Activity: Before solving a physics problem, students wrote down their goals and the steps they plan to take. **Monitoring Questions:** “How do you know your solution is correct?” Example, Activity: During problem-solving, students periodically check their work and discuss their thought processes with peers.

**Evaluating Questions:** “What could you have done differently? Example, Activity: After completing a problem, students reflected on their approach and identified any mistakes or alternative methods. **Control Group:** Continue with traditional teaching methods without the use of metacognitive questioning techniques.

The Post-Test was administered after 8 weeks, were the CTST and MAI again to both groups to measure any changes in their critical thinking skills and metacognitive awareness. Example, Activity: Students retake the CTST, and their scores were compared to their pre-test results. Data was collected from students’ scores from the pre-tests and post-tests. Example Activity: Compile the test scores into a database for analysis. To ensure the reliability of the measurement instruments: The pre-and post-tests were administered at two different points in time to the same group of students to check for consistency in their responses. The internal consistency of the test items was assessed using Cronbach’s alpha and getting 0.86. Descriptive Statistics was used to calculate the means and standard deviations for pre-test and post-test scores. Example, Activity: Using statistical software to generate descriptive statistics for the collected data. The Inferential statistics of ANCOVA (Analysis of Covariance) were used to control for any pre-existing differences between the groups and to determine the effect of the intervention on students’ critical thinking skills. Example, Activity: Perform ANCOVA to analyze the impact of metacognitive questioning techniques on the experimental group’s performance **Qualitative Analysis:** The Conducted interviews with a subset of students from the experimental group to gain insights into their experiences with metacognitive questioning techniques. Example Activity: Analyze interview transcripts to identify common themes and student perceptions.

## **Results**

### **Research Question 1**

What are the differences in critical thinking skills between students who receive instruction incorporating metacognitive questioning techniques and those who receive traditional instruction?

### Results for Research Question 1

**Table 1: Pre-test and Post-test Scores for Experimental and Control Groups**

The results indicate that the experimental group, which received instruction incorporating metacognitive questioning techniques, showed a greater improvement in critical thinking skills compared to the control group.

### Hypothesis 1

**Null Hypothesis 1 ( $H_{01}$ ):** There is no significant difference in critical thinking skills between students who receive instruction incorporating metacognitive questioning techniques and those who receive traditional instruction.

The ANCOVA results show a significant effect of the intervention on the post-test scores ( $F(1, 42) = 38.41, p < .001$ ), leading to the rejection of Null Hypothesis 1.

### Research Question 2

What is the effectiveness of metacognitive questioning techniques in enhancing critical thinking skills among secondary school physics students?

## Results for Research Question 2

**Table 3: Pre-test and Post-test Scores for Experimental Group**

The results indicate a significant improvement in the critical thinking skills of the experimental group after the intervention.

## Hypothesis 2

**Null Hypothesis 2 (H<sub>02</sub>):** There is no significant difference between the effectiveness of metacognitive questioning techniques and traditional instruction in enhancing critical thinking skills among secondary school physics students.

The ANCOVA results show a significant effect of the metacognitive questioning techniques on the post-test scores ( $F(1, 42) = 35.67, p < .001$ ), leading to the rejection of Null Hypothesis 2.

## Research Question 3

What is the relationship between the frequency of metacognitive questioning and the improvement in critical thinking skills?

Results for Research Question 3

**Table 5: Relationship between Frequency of Metacognitive Questioning and Improvement in Critical Thinking Skills**

The results indicate a positive correlation between the frequency of metacognitive questioning and the improvement in critical thinking skills.

### Hypothesis 3

**Null Hypothesis 3 (H<sub>03</sub>):** There is no significant relationship between the frequency of metacognitive questioning and the improvement in critical thinking skills.

The correlation analysis results show a significant positive relationship ( $r = 0.65$ ,  $p < .001$ ), leading to the rejection of Null Hypothesis 3.

## **Discussion of Findings**

The findings of this study indicate that metacognitive questioning techniques significantly enhance secondary school students' critical thinking skills in physics. The experimental group, which was exposed to these techniques, showed a greater improvement in critical thinking skills and metacognitive awareness compared to the control group. This aligns with previous research that highlights the positive impact of metacognitive strategies on students' learning outcomes and cognitive development (Abdelrahman, 2020; Celik, 2022).

One of the key themes that emerged from the qualitative analysis was the increased self-awareness among students in the experimental group. This finding is consistent with the work of Morphey (2020), who found that metacognitive monitoring improves students' ability to evaluate their learning processes. Students in the experimental group reported that the metacognitive questioning techniques helped them to think more deeply about their problem-solving strategies and to identify areas for improvement. Another important finding was the improvement in problem-solving skills. This supports the results of Ulu and Yerdelen-Damar (2024), who demonstrated that metacognitive and epistemic cognition are closely related to students' self-efficacy and problem-solving abilities in physics. The students in the experimental group were able to break down complex problems into manageable parts, which facilitated a deeper understanding of the concepts.

The enhanced engagement reported by students in the experimental group also highlights the motivational benefits of metacognitive questioning techniques. This is in line with the findings of Abdelrahman (2020), who noted that metacognitive awareness and academic motivation are significant predictors of academic achievement. The interactive nature of metacognitive questioning encourages active participation and sustained interest in the subject matter.

Overall, the results of this study underscore the importance of incorporating metacognitive questioning techniques into physics education. These techniques not only improve critical thinking skills but also foster a more reflective and engaged learning environment. Future research should explore the long-term effects of these techniques and investigate their applicability in other scientific disciplines.

## **Conclusion**

This study provides compelling evidence that metacognitive questioning techniques can significantly enhance secondary school students' critical thinking skills in physics. The experimental group, which was exposed to these techniques, showed greater improvements in both critical thinking skills and metacognitive awareness compared to the control group. The qualitative data further support these

findings, highlighting the positive experiences of students who engaged with metacognitive questioning techniques.

The results align with previous research, demonstrating that metacognitive strategies are effective in improving students' learning outcomes and cognitive development. The study highlights the importance of fostering metacognitive awareness and critical thinking skills in physics education to prepare students for complex problem-solving and lifelong learning.

Future research should continue to explore the impact of metacognitive questioning techniques across different educational contexts and disciplines. Additionally, longitudinal studies could provide insights into the long-term benefits of these techniques on students' academic and personal development.

### **Recommendations**

1. **Integration of Metacognitive Questioning Techniques in Curriculum:** Schools should train teachers to use metacognitive questioning strategies in the physics curriculum.
2. **Professional Development for Teachers:** Organize continuous professional development programs to equip physics teachers with skills for implementing metacognitive questioning techniques.
3. **Encouraging Student Reflection:** Create an environment that encourages regular student self-reflection on their thought processes and problem-solving strategies.
4. **Use of Technology to Support Metacognitive Practices:** Integrate technology in classrooms to support metacognitive questioning techniques through tools like online forums and digital journals.
5. **Further Research:** Conduct longitudinal studies to explore the long-term effects of metacognitive questioning techniques on students' critical thinking and academic performance.
6. **Application Across Disciplines:** Apply metacognitive questioning techniques to other subjects to foster critical thinking and self-regulated learning across the curriculum.

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
