ADDRESSING CHALLENGES OF MATHEMATICS EDUCATION IN NIGERIA THROUGH IMPLEMENTATION OF MATHEMATICS EDUCATION BY

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Abstract

Mathematics education 5.0 is a new approach to teaching and learning Mathematics that emphasizes personalized and interactive learning experiences using technology. This paper examines the challenges and prospects of Mathematics education 5.0 in Nigeria. Introduction

Early education was informal and based on apprenticeship and observation; writing enabled the emergence of formal educational institutions, such as the Greek educational system. With the advent of public education systems and the integration of technology into teaching and learning, education has undergone substantial change in the contemporary period (Nur & Izwita, 2022).

After the Covid 19 the paradigm of education shifted toward online learning. Today's education is not just a process of sharing and delivering an instruction to the students, it appears that online education plays a significant role and has long-lasting effects on society

(Nikum, 2022). Students need a variety of skills, values, creativity, and research-based education in addition to knowledge. The student's class consists of individuals with a variety of mentalities and cognitive styles. It is impossible to please every student when learning online. Hence, the most recent development in education, Education 5.0 which aims to use technology to provide a tailored and student-centered learning experience in mathematics where the learner is given priority over technology (Muzira & Bondai, 2020).

Mathematics remains a tool in the all-round development of leaners, so the mathematics experience makes learners creative and humane in the process of carrying out investigations and solving problems that affect the general society (Momozoku, Audu & Niyi, 2022). Mathematics education has been facing several challenges which has affected learners' proficiency in mathematics and academic achievement over the years. One of the major challenges is the lack of student interest and motivation towards mathematics. Other challenges according to (Aditi, 2017; Niyi, Job, Alagbe, Audu, 2018; Olulonye & Ihendinihu, 2013) in mathematics education include the shortage of qualified mathematics teachers, poor teacher remuneration and motivation, lack of necessary teaching aids, learner anxiety and phobia, teaching methods and infrastructure.

Mathematics Education 5.0 has the potential to address the challenges faced by mathematics education. This new era of education is characterized by personalized and interactive learning experiences. Students are provided with customized learning paths based on their individual learning styles, needs, and preferences. This approach allows students to learn mathematics at their own pace and provides them with the necessary support to succeed using face to face, virtual and augmented reality and artificial intelligence.

Nigeria still lags behind when it comes to education in Africa, the country was ranked 15th in Africa behind Zimbabwe, Libya and Rwanda in education as at 2021 and nothing much has changed (Afolabi, 2023). Hence the urgent need to modernize education especially mathematics education with the potentials of Mathematics Education 5.0. This paper therefore examines the basic features of Mathematics Education 5.0, its challenges and prospects for Mathematics Education in Nigeria.

Mathematics Education 5.0

The idea of "Education 5.0" places an emphasis on using technology to make learning more individualized and learner-centered. The main goal is to re-humanize education so that

humans rather than machines are the foundation of learning. According to Nikum (2022), it is an improvement over preceding versions of education, including Mathematics Education 1.0 (traditional lecture-based learning), Mathematics Education 2.0 (interactive learning using computers), Mathematics Education 3.0 (web-based learning with social media and collaboration tools), and Mathematics Education 4.0 (adaptive learning with artificial intelligence and machine learning). Mathematics Education 5.0 takes these concepts further by incorporating technologies such as virtual and augmented reality, artificial intelligence, and personalized learning algorithms to create a more immersive and interactive learning experience.



The implication for the government as critical stakeholder is the Mathematics Education 5.0 would bring about business and industrial growth (Alharbi, 2023) if the government makes the right policies and financial commitments to Mathematics Education 5.0. Therefore, it is important for government, policymakers, educators, and other stakeholders to work together to ensure that Education 5.0 is implemented effectively in mathematics education.


